NAES RECEIVES LOWE'S GRANT FOR "DAWG WALK TRAILS & RUNNING COURSE"

Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation has awarded a \$4,300 Toolbox for Education grant to New Albany Elementary School (NAES) to provide a nature trail, walking path, and running course for students. NAES is one of more than 480 schools or parent organizations to be awarded a Lowe's Toolbox for Education grant for parent-initiated school improvement projects benefiting K-12 public education across the United States during the 2010-2011 school year.

The "Lowe's Dawg Walk Trails and Running Course" will provide many educational experiences for students. This project will enhance instruction in the areas of physical education, science, and reading. In addition, opportunities will be given to the students to become involved in extra-curricular and after-school activities. The course will be 3.1 miles long, eight feet across, and will connect the Backyard School Habitat and the Outdoor Classroom. The project is scheduled for completion in August 2011.

"Through Lowe's Toolbox for Education grant program, we are acknowledging parent-initiated efforts that enhance the lives of children in the communities we serve," said Larry D. Stone, chairman of Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation. Launched in partnership with PTO Today, a leading organization serving parent-teacher groups, the Toolbox for Education program has provided more than \$20 million through more than 5,000 grants since its inception five years ago. Grants of up to \$5,000 are available to public schools in the U.S. for a wide range of improvement projects. All K-12 public schools in the United States are eligible. Since its inception in 1957, Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation has helped communities nationwide through employee volunteerism and financial contributions.

Lowe's supports the communities it serves through programs that focus on K-12 public education and community improvement projects. The company's signature education grant program, Lowe's Toolbox for Education, has brought more than \$5 million in grants to K-12 public schools every year since its inception in 2005.
